Illinois' Homeless and Housing line items provide a vital safety net to families experiencing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness.


INCREASE FUNDING FOR EMERGENCY AND TRANSITIONAL HOUSING TO \$10.4 MILLION


In FY17 this safety net program provided comprehensive shelter services to over 32,793 adults and children. But at the current funding level, people are <u>turned away over 38,000 times</u> annually due to lack of funding and resources.

RETURN HOMELESS YOUTH FUNDING TO 5.6 MILLION

As a result of the budget impasse, 46% of the homeless youth organizations reduced and/or eliminated services for youth. Illinois saves money when it invests, in Homeless Youth Programs, which prevent youth involvement in other more costly systems.

Increase Homelessness Prevention Funding

This line item has experienced dramatic cuts in the state budget. At its height Homelessness Prevention received \$11 million. This meant 14,000 households received needed assistance annually.

As of FY18, the funding is at \$4.9 million, a fraction of previous levels, meaning less people are served.








Increase the Homelessness Prevention by <u>\$2 million dollars</u> so that service providers will be able to provide <u>more grants</u> and <u>services</u> <u>to eligible families</u>.

This program has proved successful, cost saving, and a commonsense way in which to keep Illinois families off the streets.

In studying Chicago's Homeless
Prevention Program between 20102012, the University of Notre Dame
researchers found that those who
called when funding was available—
and received the cash assistance—
were 88% less likely to become
homeless after 3 months and 76%
less likely after 6 months.



With this one time grant of \$1,000 homelessness prevention services is estimated to save \$7,548 annually keeping individuals and families housed and stable.*
